■ Look at these numbers.

Say out loud what the numbers are.

The number 2 is used in all of them and each time it means something different.

- 2 means 2 lots of 1s (or units).
- 22 means 2 lots of 1s and 2 lots of 10s.
- 222 means 2 lots of 100 and two lots of 10s and two lots of 1s.

The place where the 2 is tells us its value.

To understand 10s and 1s (units) try the exercise over the page with money.
